Hooking Happenings (Rug Hooking that is)

When I got the project to work on, I did a little reading in Joan Moshimer's book The Complete Book of Rug Hooking. It's an older book, but is full of lots of useful information. The thing I got out of it was how important it is to cut the "worms" or strips from the straight of grain of the fabric. Apparently if the grain is not followed, the strip will not be as strong and durable in a rug. She says it's not as important in a wall hanging, but now I know that the "worms" are actually easier to hook when they are cut straight! They also don't fray as much.

So I was glad I took the time to look at this reference book and found this useful tidbit. We meet on the 4th Thursday of each month at the studio from 1 - 3. It is open to members of the Guild.

Spin to Knit, The Knitter's Guide to Making Yarn by Shannon Okey is from Interweave Press. This is a good starter book for those of us who knit yet are "out-to-lunch" when it comes to spinning. It seems pretty basic, but is probably a good place to start when you know nothing. Okey includes some general (though perhaps cursory) information on fibers, spindles, and wheels, and will get you started with the process of spinning. She discusses handspun from a knitter's perspective and addresses colors and other embellishments. She also provides a glossary and a list of resources.

The book includes more than thirty simple knitting patterns, including hats, sweaters, scarves, socks, and wraps. If you are wondering if you might like to spin your own knitting yarns, this could give you a good introduction.

Warped Weavers

The Warped Weavers have chosen their next weave structure. Crackle weave is a Swedish technique called Jamtlandsvav. In 1926 Mary Meigs-Atwater introduced it to American weavers and feeling that it's name was a bit of a mouthful, renamed it Crackle. The pattern reminded her of the cracked glaze on pottery. The defining elements of this weave structure are point twill thread units with incidental threads between the blocks. These blocks must join together in twill progression, although there are special provisions when skipping blocks. It uses tabby and supplementary wefts and produces a very stable fabric that is great for towels and upholstery. With lighter threads it is also perfect for all types of textiles. Our group has chosen several kinds of projects including several doing scarves out of 8/2 Tencel. Everyone seems excited to start exploring this weave structure and using two shuttles.

Create your own Nametag

Last year several of us created our own felted nametag. Some of you may still be interested in making one for this year's Fest. It was fun to have one for the Fiber Fair last year.

The following is what I came up with. If you would like to do something the same or similar, I'm attaching the how-to according to me! This produces a flat felted background cloth about 3.5" x 4.5" to then be embellished . You can use a an I-cord for the "strap" knit from variegated type sock yarn or maybe a ribbon, or whatever.

You will need a feltable wool – not superwash. I used worsted weight 100% Peruvian wool and #7 knitting needles. This could also be crocheted to something of the same size.

Cast on 22 stitches and knit one or 2 rows in garter (knit every row). On the next row you may put in a small slit (buttonhole) at each corner (for a lanyard, or ribbon, or braid) by knitting 2 stitches, cast off 2 stitches, knit 14 stitches, then cast off 2 stitches. Knit last 2 stitches. On the return row you will need to cast on 2 stitches over the gap. I used a backward loop cast on. Go on knitting until your piece measures about 4" and then bind

Now for felting. This is fun and quick. I used a small bucket in a sink and filled the bucket with hot soapy water. Get the knit piece wet and put dish soap on it. Scrub the piece roughly as if you were trying to get a stain out! Rinse a little in cold water, then do the soap and hot water thing again. Repeat as needed. Any variation of this will make this little wool piece felt so it looks like – well - "felt!" I thoroughly rinsed it, got as much water out as possible and then shaped it a little into a rectangle and let it dry flat.

To make it into a nametag, I needle felted my name using some handspun yarn that contrasted with the background. You could embroider your name and embellish any way you'd like. You could do fancy stitches, add fringe, beads, etc.

I 've been knitting a few extra "blanks" (felted pieces- in case you can't get one done). One studio evening (to be determined,) I'll bring my felting needles, etc. You would be welcome to use them and any supplies I might have to make your own nametag. So far, this has been a fun project for me, and hope it would be for you too!






