BOARD MEMBERS THE NEWSLETTER DEADLINE IS ON THE 12TH OF THE MONTH Recently, members of the Warped Weavers were lamenting that many times one of them wants to do a project but lacks just a few yards of this color or that. And then they have to stop and order a full cone of something and wait a week for it to arrive, when one of the other weavers may have exactly what they needed in their stash. We all bemoaned the fact that we couldn't just run across town to a store to get a cone or two of 8/2 cotton when we wanted. So an idea was born.

We all have a stash, and many of us have stuff in our stash that we probably will never use. For example, I got a great deal on several cones of 8/2 cotton in various shades of pink. I really don't know what I was thinking (other than it was a great deal) because I really dislike pink (it goes back to when I was a little girl and my mother insisting that I everything I owned was pink because I was the only girl with 3 older brothers). Anyway–I am not going to make anything out of pink, because just thinking of weaving for hours and hours looking at pink makes me nauseous. Meanwhile the cones of perfectly good pink 8/2 cotton are taking up valuable space in my very small studio. So the weavers of the Warped Weavers decided to try an experiment. Inside the door of the studio is a bookshelf that has been mostly empty. We have decided to bring in those items of our stash that just don't excite us the way they once did. For a minimal cost one of the other weavers (or anyone that might be interested) can purchase a cone of this or even a partial cone of that. Those cones of pink that I mentioned before are priced at \$2. If pink is your color you can take the tag that is on the cone, and put it and the appropriate amount of money in an envelope provided and put Mary Ellen on the outside of the envelope. Then in the cupboard is a cash box. Place the envelope in the cash box and take home your prize. If you only need a bit of it, then you are welcome to bring back the partial cone and sell it to someone else. There are tags on the top shelf so that you can resell it or anything in your stash that you just are not in love with anymore. We are not in this experiment for money. It is a way to allow everyone of us to get a bit of this or that, that might make that towel or scarf just what we dreamed without having to order something and wait (I hate waiting!)

So, take a look the next time you are at the studio for something that just rings your bell, or floats your boat or whatever and take it home. There are full and partial cones of all sorts of thread and yarn, and for you knitters and crocheters there are skeins of stuff on the bottom shelf. If your stash is threatening to crowd you right out of your studio, bring a few things in and see if someone just loves it and takes it home. We all thought that a minimal cost on each item was better than just a free exchange. We all have a tendency to appreciate something more that we have to pay for.


