So much so in fact that we're thinking of carrying on to do other weaving items, both to just get together for a few hours and to learn from each other. There are a lot of members with a great deal of weaving experience. We thought we could even warp one of the other looms in the studio for a project.

Our meeting schedule will be the 1st and 3rd Mondays of the month from 11-1 with participants bringing their own sack lunch. The next get-together will be February 15th. Anyone with interest is welcome. This is a good time to try weaving in a casual atmosphere!

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In at the Guild library —check it out

New to the guild library this month is *Book 1: The Knit Stitch* by Sally Melville. Thanks to Laurel Cahoon for this donation

The Knit Stitch takes the knitter from the basics such as casting-on and binding-off through various shapes and garments and on into fixing common mistakes. Melville rounds things up with lists of suppliers and yarn weights; as well as abbreviations, a glossary, and a table of comparative ratios (which I had never heard of, but then I only knit things that don't have to fit anyone).

The photographs are abundant, lovely, and useful, particularly those used to explain various techniques. There are some lovely projects to illustrate various techniques, or just because you want to do them. Melville will help you to make scarves, ponchos, sweaters, hats, mittens, and so much more.

Back in 2010 I read a letter from Amy Clark Moore, the editor of Spin-Off, that really touched a chord with me and I have read it many times since then. She said;

"While I'll always strive to be better, I realize that it isn't a competition. There will always be someone who can make things more successfully than I can, but that's not the point. I'm not making things to be the best, I'm making things because in the making I find contentment, peace, and a self-sufficient joy that fuels me and gives meaning to my life. Sure, I'd like the things I make to be expressive and beautiful, but it is a journey, a process—and not everything I make will be successful, but I'll learn a lot along the way."

Her words express exactly my point. I ALWAYS make mistakes when I make something. Sometimes I catch them and have to unweave or rip out my knitting back to before my mistake. But sometimes I don't spot it until I take it off the loom. I have to remind myself that I am not in this for a perfect product. Although I have to admit, it would be nice. I am really into this for the creative aspect. I have a great need to create. I love color, texture, the history behind the fiber arts. I want to take yarn or thread and create something that will last; a piece of beauty that expresses who I am and connects me with the past. So... .I am a little flawed. But it is the creativity of weaving, or knitting that I love.

FIBER FEST TEACHERS AND CLASSES

Teachers and classes for the May Fiber Fest have now been confirmed. Below is a list of teachers and classes that will be at the Fiber Fest.

Connie Denton will be returning and teaching two baskets over two days. One is a Lazy Kate Spinning Basket that will have room for spinning supplies. The other one is a picnic basket that includes a checkerboard on the underside of the wooden lid.

Steven McEwen will be teaching a class on the "Mechanics of a Spinning Wheel". This will be either a half day class or a whole day. Steven was here last year as a vendor.

Lonna Alexander - Steele is returning and will be teaching four classes. One on using up old or recycled yarns, one on knitting flocati, one on spinning batts, and on the spinning boucles.

Doris Florig is a world traveler who did a slide show of her travels a few years ago. She's returning this year with another slide show of her travels AND to teach a class on TANIKO-twining or finger-weaving, and one on IKAT dying.
